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TYPES OF FUNDING

- **Grants:** Funds awarded by governments, corporations, and charitable foundations to support projects or initiatives that align with a funder's goals.
- Request for Proposals (RFPs): An invitation from an organization to vendors, companies or nonprofit organizations to compete for a contract by proposing how they will complete a specific project.
- **Foundation Opportunities:** Funding opportunities provided by private or community foundations supporting intiatives within specific focus areas.

HOW GRANTS WORK

- **Eligibility**: Each grant has its own eligibility criteria and it is important to read the description carefully. Some grants may only be open to specific types of organizations (e.g., research institutions, non-profits) while others may target specific regions, populations, or fields of study (e.g., age-friendly communities).
- Application Process: To apply for a grant, you will need to prepare a proposal
 explaining your project/initiative, why it's needed, and how the grant money will be
 used. Proposals typically include a timeline, a detailed budget, and expected
 outcomes.
- **Evaluation:** Grant committees evaluate each proposal and look at factors such as the project's feasibility, the potential impact, and how the project aligns with the grant's goals (e.g., enhancing accessibility, health, or social inclusion for grants related to age-friendly communities).
- Awarding: Successful applicants are then notified and receive the grant money. Each
 organization will have specific reporting requirements such as regular updates on
 project progress, financial reports, or a final report demonstrating the project's
 outcomes.

WRITING THE GRANT

Most grants will require the following elements in the proposal.

• Executive Summary:

- o Provide a synopsis of the entire proposal.
- Include a brief overview of your organization, purpose of the project, project goals, and how the funds will be used.

• Introduction of Organization:

- Share relevant history of your organization such as your mission, vision, past initiatives, and any partnerships or collaborations.
- o Include information about key staff members, volunteers, and Board members.
- State and explain your organization's philosophy and goals. Draw connections between your mission and that of the funding opportunity.

• Problem Statement:

- Clearly define the problem or issue your project would like to address.
- Highlight the urgency of the issue. Explain why your project needs to start right now.
- Provide any data or evidence to support the problem you have identified.
- o Explain why your solution will make a difference

• Goals and Objectives:

- o Describe what your project aims to achieve.
- Clearly align your project's goals with that of the funding opportunity.
- Ensure your objectives are specific, measurable, and have a concrete time frame.

• Project Design/Methodology:

- Provide a detailed plan of how the project will be implemented.
- Describe your proposed solution including steps, timelines, and required resources.
- Be sure to connect your strategies to your objectives and problem statement.

• Evaluation:

- Outline how the success/impact of the project will be measured and the time frame needed for evaluation.
- Include methods and success metrics such as outputs and outcomes.

Budget:

- Provide a detailed breakdown of all costs including personnel, program development, materials, and any other costs.
- Be sure to justify all expenses. For example, if you want to hire a research assistant, explain what they will do and why they are needed for the project.

Sustainability:

- Explain how the project will be maintained or expanded after the grant period ends.
- Mention any additional funding you plan to receive such as in-kind funding and any other government funding.

TIP: Most granting and funding competitions post recipient lists, Consider reaching out to other organizations recipient lists for advice, support or guidance

TIP: Consider working with a grantwriter who has previous success with the grants you are applying to

FRAMING YOUR PROBLEM

The **Age-Friendly Community Process** can be a helpful tool for you to determine where your organization is in terms of supporting an age-friendly community. The process includes four steps.

Step 1: Define Local Principles

Create an Age-Friendly Community profile

Step 2: Assess Needs

Community Needs Assessment **Step 3**: Develop an Action Plan

Identify strategies (actions) to address gap

Step 4: Implement and Evaluate

Scale, Research, Evaluation, Implications

Additionally, consider the **eight key domains** where communities can become more age-friendly:

- 1. Outdoor spaces and buildings
- 2. Transportation
- 3. Housing
- 4. Social participation

- 5. Respect and social inclusion
- 6. Civic participation and employment
- 7. Communication and information
- 8. Community support and health services

PERFORMANCE METRICS

When developing a plan for evaluating the success of your project, consider looking at outputs and outcomes.

- Outputs are direct, tangible products or services delivered by a project.
 - The immediate results of activities that can be easily measured in terms of quantity.
 - What you produce as part of the project.

• Examples of Measurable Activities:

- 10 digital literacy workshops are conducted over 6 months, with 100 seniors attending.
- Each participant receives a training manual on using the internet and basic apps.
- Outcomes are broader, longer-term effects or changes that result from the outputs
 - Represent the change you want to see because of the project.
 - The impact or benefit that the project brings about in the lives of the target audience which can be difficult to measure.

Examples of Lasting Change:

- Seniors report increased confidence in using smartphones and computers for everyday tasks such as accessing health services online or staying connected with family.
- Over time, 80% of participants continue using technology regularly, reducing social isolation and improving access to online services.
